

Two Theses

- Applicational Thesis: In the presence of one who is experiencing difficulties of any severity, a pastoral care provider's *primary* response is not one of providing a remedy for the problems at hand but rather being a journey mate through the personal hardship as God's purposes are explored.

Definitions

Πειρασμοσ (parasmos)- Refers to outward trials as well as inward temptations.

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Suffering, a working definition: Any experience that causes internal or external duress physically, emotionally, spiritually and/or relationally.

Context: End of first missionary trip full of persecution

Acts 14:22

Paul's point is that an aspect of existing in the Kingdom of Christ is difficulties. This is the way God has designed it.

A brief look at some of God's purposes for affliction in the lives of His servants.

1. Affliction is an essential element in the maturation process

James 1, Romans 5 & 8

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James 1:2-4
Count it all joy... knowing that:
Various trials → Patience → maturity
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Romans 5:2-4
Glory in tribulation... knowing that:
Tribulation → Endurance → Character → Hope

"The Father is seeking persevering sons and daughters who take on the shape of Christ Through adversity with joy."

2. Affliction tests and strengthens our faith that it may be pleasing to Christ

1 Peter 1:6-7

3. Affliction has the potential to form in us a resolution toward obedience over pain avoidance

1 Peter 4:1-2

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God's relentless desire is to shape Christ in us regardless of the temporal fallout and He is committed to building that same determination in us.

4. God uses difficulties to discipline us for character deficiency

Hebrews 12:5-11

(God's pursuit of Christ in us)

5. Affliction is our spiritual heritage and a key determinate of our eternal reward

Matthew 5:10-12

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"For to you it has been *granted* on behalf of Christ, not only to believe in Him, but also *to suffer* for His sake" Philippians 1:29

From God's perspective, suffering is a gift.

Summary: Those born into Christ are born into adversity

Theological Premise Revisited:

God has created the human soul in such a manner that it reaches its full depth of maturity through suffering. This is the path that He has marked out for all who desire to be transformed into the image of Christ. God is relentless in His pursuit of Christ being formed in us and uses all of life toward this end.

A Consideration of some possible responses of the pastoral care provider towards one who is experiencing affliction.

Goal: Increase our ability *to discern* God's transcendent work in others lives and increase our capacity *to be with* others in this process.

1. Posture of God-awareness

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Where is Christ already at work here?

How can I join in on God's sovereign purposes?

Am I willing to seek hard after God to hear from Him on behalf of the one who is struggling?

2. Posture of Other-awareness

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We must listen, and listen long, before we have gained a right to speak.

What is this person experiencing?
How is it impacting them?
How are they responding? Relating?
What am I hearing? Seeing?

3. Posture of Giving of Ourselves

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Epaphroditus' example: He "came close to death" Philippians 2:25

3. Posture of Giving of Ourselves

Have I prepared my heart to be poured out for others?

Am I willing to repeatedly go into those difficult relationships and international regions to serve His servants?

Am I willing to lay my life down for others?

4. Posture of Waiting

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Am I willing to endure with the one who is being called by God to endure pain?

Have I fostered in my heart space and the capacity to linger in difficult pastoral scenarios?

Born for Adversity

- 1. Missionaries, by calling, live under duress.
- 2. The pastoral care provider's primary responsibility is to join God in His work in and through missionaries' lives and ministry.
- 3. We serve God and missionaries well when we increase our understanding of God's use of affliction in the shaping of His servants and develop the capacity of our hearts to journey with others in those hard times.
